Old Sewickley Post Office Collecting Art Through the Ages

An Illustrated Presentation by Robert J. Trombetta



The vast majority of the world's great art museums owe their existence to the efforts of a small number of individual collectors. Through the ages, starting in antiquity, collecting beautiful and thought-provoking objects has been a part of human nature.

Mr. Robert Trombetta will join us to discuss the great movements in art history and the collectors who controlled the art market. We will learn how many of the decisions of these past collectors influenced the art world and museums of today. Included in the discussion, will be prominent Pittsburgh collectors of the past.

Robert J. Trombetta, retired director of the Fort Pitt Museum, has participated in the quest for rare art and artifacts for over fifty years. A native of Washington County, Mr. Trombetta began collecting Native American artifacts at the age of seven. He quickly became a devoted collector of art and artifacts from around the world. He has spent years studying other collectors and the institutions they helped to create. His recently published book, *David Michael Bowers, the Evolution of an Artist*, explores the career of a Pittsburgh artist who is quickly gaining international recognition.



A Gift of Way Material

On a recent visit to the Historical Society, Bee (Way) and Woody Rutter presented us with several boxes of material relating to the Way family.

Among the treasures is the following, transcribed by Frederick Way, Jr., from the diary of David Shields (1780-1857). Shields moved from Washington, Pennsylvania, to "Newington," his wife's property in Sewickley Bottom, in 1823. He was appointed first Postmaster in the Valley in 1824, serving in that capacity until his death. His descendants still live at "Newington."

1830. Dec 16th. It may be worthy of notice for the inquisitive eye of a future reader (when the writer of this shall also have disappeared) that of the original wild game of this Country there are Red deer and Turkeys on the hills immediately back of this Sewickley Bottom. A wolf was killed near this place some 5 or 6 years since. None have been seen since of those destructive animals. Oppossums [sic], Foxes, Minks, raccoons +c are numerous here at all times...

1834. Nov 8th. A Bear was killed yesterday by one of the Scotts, about 2 miles up the Creek. Bears have been strangers in this part of the country for many years – this Autumn there have been several seen, who have probably come from the North, there being no nuts or acorns in the Country...

1839. Dec 8th. A Fire occurred this day P.M. in the house occupied by Nevin & Champ as a boarding school [the 1810 Way Tavern, still standing on Beaver Road, Edgeworth, a forerunner of today's Sewickley Academy], which destroyed the Northern or old end. The day was calm and atmosphere damp and heavy and the people zealous. On the 9th the rubbish was removed and on the 10th carpenters began to rebuild and repair.

1840. Feb 6th. The Plasterers finished their work at Way's house [the Abishai Way House, also still standing on Beaver Road, Edgeworth], the Carpenters having finished theirs some days previous.
