Land of Canaan: The Scots-Irísh Presbyterían Experience ín Early Western Pennsylvanía A PowerPoint Presentation by Peter E. Gilmore, Ph.D.

Presbyterians of Irish origin—the people usually known as the Scots-Irish—helped shape our region and became transformed in the process. A Scottish missionary passing through Pittsburgh in 1798 wrote home that "A great many of the inhabitants have come from Ireland. They seem to be an industrious people, and many of them religious." This presentation will consider how and why they came to western Pennsylvania in notably significant numbers, their way of life and the role of faith. What made their Presbyterianism—and these Scots-Irish Presbyterians—unique in western Pennsylvania?

Peter Gilmore received a Ph.D. in social and cultural history from Carnegie Mellon University. His research and writing is centered on Presbyterians of Irish origin in western Pennsylvania and the intersection of religion, ethnicity and class. One of his most recent publications is "The 'Moral Duty' of Public Covenanting in the Antebellum United States: New-World Exigencies, Old-World Response," which appeared last year in *The Journal of Transatlantic Studies*. Dr. Gilmore is currently an adjunct professor of history at Carlow and Carnegie Mellon Universities.
