Journey from the Attic: Unlocking Your Family's History

A PowerPoint Presentation by Pamela Israel, assisted by Stefan Israel

Surrounded by genealogy from an early age, Pamela Israel has long appreciated the richness that can come from learning about one's heritage. Using her own family stories, she approached her brother Stefan, who holds a Ph.D. in Germanic linguistics, to be her first translator and launched Unlock Your History to help people translate their heirloom family documents from German and other Germanic languages. Pamela is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, the Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society and the North Hills Genealogical Society.

This presentation will tap into today's fascination with learning about one's family's past. Pamela and Stephan will dig into how to make sense of heirloom documents, frequently in another language, which are passed down across generations and are often stashed in the attic. They'll show how one can decipher some clues hidden within the documents and recommend when to get more help. They'll also go a little deeper into the number one-claimed heritage in the United States, German, with some extra background that can assist anyone to become a little bit more of an expert.

If you have documents written in a Germanic or Scandinavian language that you can't decipher, bring them in. Stefan will look at them and help you identify the language, if necessary, and translate them, giving you at least a general idea of their content.

2019 Architectural Preservation Award

As part of its mission, Sewickley Valley Historical Society encourages preservation of the architectural heritage of the community, and since 1987 the Society has presented Architectural Preservation Awards to worthy projects. Although the honor is not bestowed every year and often multiple awards are made, 2019 marks the 26th such award. This year the award is being given to a commercial building, as was the very first one, presented to Ettore Miceli for the Victorian store front at 412 Beaver Street, Sewickley, the longtime location of Miceli's Tailor Shop.

The 2019 Architectural Preservation Award recipient is Mediterra Café, 430 Beaver Street, Sewickley. The recent renovation and restoration of the building has been a collaborative effort of Nick Ambeliotis, founder

of Pittsburgh-based Mediterra Bake-house; Tom McCargo, building owner and president of Urban Villages, Inc., which focuses on long-term value generation through place-oriented design; and Heather Wildman of Wildman Chalmers Design, which earned a Certificate of Merit for Mediterra Café in the Small Projects category of AIA Pittsburgh's 2018 Design Pittsburgh competition.

Mediterra's block in the Village has a long history of food service. The building was originally home to the E. W. Becker butcher shop, followed by Carroll's Cash Market, then Brand's Meat Market, and was adjacent to the Continental Grocery Store and Gray's Meat Market.

The award will be presented at the Annual Meeting, May 15.

etty G. Y. Shields was editor of the *Sewickley Herald* from 1972 to 1987. In 1973, she called the Bfirst meeting of what became the Sewickley Valley Historical Society and is listed as a founding member. After retiring from the *Herald*, she served as the Historical Society's Executive Director until 2005. During the nation's bicentennial in 1976, she was one of the three chairs of the Sewickley Valley Bicentennial Committee. She was also a founding member of the Little Sewickley Creek Watershed Association. B. G., as she was known to her friends and family, was born February 26, 1925, in Coffeyville, Kansas, and died July 12, 2017, in Lemont, Pennsylvania.
